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Language Interpretation Selection Instructions - English

- If you are an English speaker, please select English by clicking the interpretation button at the bottom right-hand side of your Zoom computer screen (where you see the globe icon).
- If you are a Spanish speaker, please select Spanish. If you are an Arabic speaker, please select Arabic.
- Everyone must choose a language: English, Spanish, or Arabic
- If you are joining via the Zoom smartphone app, select your language by clicking “MORE” or the three dots in the bottom right corner of your screen. Select “language interpretation,” then choose “English,” “Spanish,” or “Arabic,” and click “DONE.”

Language Interpretation Selection Instructions - Spanish

إذا كنت تنضم إلينا عبر تطبيق Zoom للهاتف الذكي ، فحدد لغتك بالضغط فوق كلمة "المزيد" more أو النقاط الثلاث في الزاوية اليمنى السفلية من شاشتك. حدد "ترجمة اللغة" ثم اختر "الإنجليزية" أو الإسبانية أو العربية ، ثم اضغط فوق كلمة "تم".

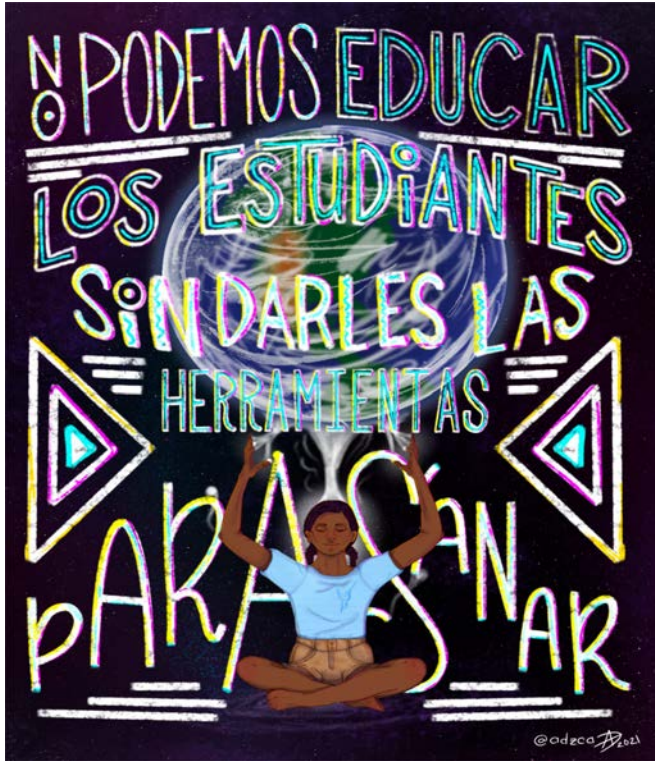

Community Needs Assessment 2020



- More than 20 grassroots organizations spoke with 600 students and families from low-income communities of color.
- The goal was to understand the needs of students and families and organize at the state and local level to address these needs.
- Key themes emerged: the need for mental health support; students feeling they lacked a sense of belonging and relationships at their school; a need for access to equitable learning opportunities; and the importance of engaging students and families as decision-making partners.

\$4.1 Billion For Community Schools!



- In 2020, \$45 million allocated for community schools.
- In 2021, \$3 Billion for the California Community Schools Partnership (CCSPP) program!
- In 2022, \$1.1 additional allocated for CCSPP!

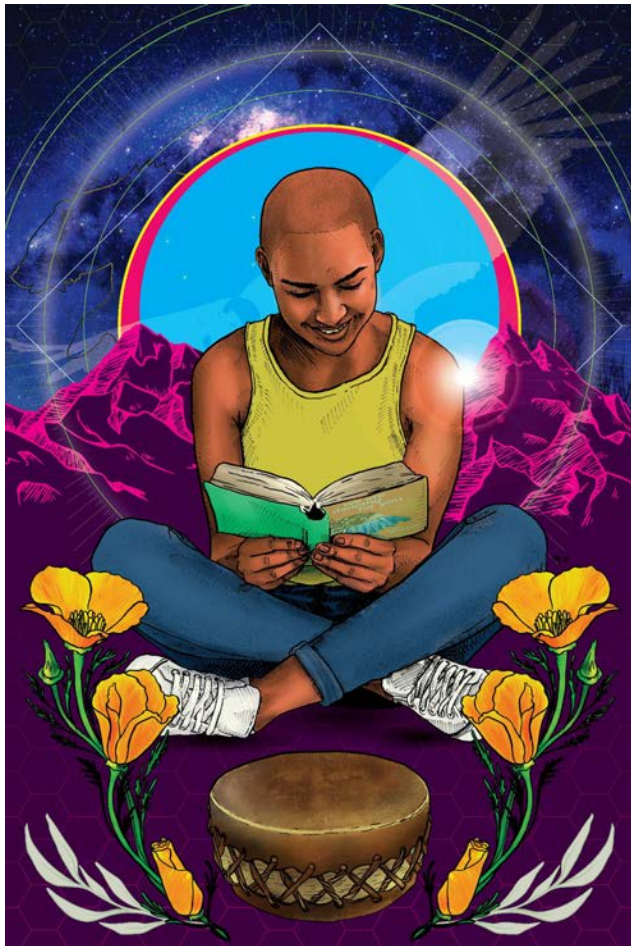
Racially Just, Relationship-Centered, Transformative Schools

- 60+ delegations -- We met with folx from the State Board of Education, California Department of Education, legislative leadership, Department of Finance, and more, we also got support & sign-ons from over 50 organizing, advocacy, policy, & research orgs!

Strong Uptake of CS Grants

The California Community Schools Partnership Program has funded:

- 419 local education agencies for two rounds of planning grants (\$83.3M)
- 76 local education agencies for one round of implementation grants, representing 458 high-poverty schools (\$625.6M)



What are Transformative Community Schools?

Transformative Community Schools are a long-term strategy for whole school and systems transformation. ***“Transformative Community Schools” are not a program, they’re an approach to HOW we do school in California.***

Transformative Community Schools start with building trusting relationships and teams that involve ALL members of the school community - students, families, educators and community partners. Team members share power, decision-making, and responsibility.

Transformative Community Schools are rooted in liberatory anti-racist approaches to teaching and learning. Curricula is culturally rooted, sustaining, and joyful. It’s relevant, project-based, and connected to the wider community, and it includes the arts, movement, and the outdoors.

Transformative Community Schools engage and leverage the power of partnerships and diverse funding sources - with community-based partners, neighbors, and government agencies grounded in mutual support and respect.
